At the end of the term, we said goodbye to Ms Hanna and Mr Riorden. Both have been long term members of our school community. Ms Hanna started at Menai as a class teacher before gaining the head teacher role through merit selection. The impact she has made in leading and delivering teaching and learning within the Science faculty and across the school has been outstanding. Her positive and insightful contribution to the executive team has been highly valued. Mr Riorden's tireless work and energy in the CAPA faculty teaching Drama and Entertainment Industries has been excellent. His professional and committed contributions as Relieving HT Wellbeing, Year Adviser and Entertainment Crew Master have all been very much appreciated across the school. Both Ms Hanna and Mr Riorden have made a difference in the lives of so many students and, on behalf of the school, I wish them all the very best as they embark on the next chapter of their educational careers.

School Improvement and Project Update

- <u>Kitchen upgrade</u> Food Lab1 was upgraded over the last few weeks of Term 2. The lab now has been fitted with updated food prep and cooking appliances designed to meet Food Technology and Hospitality course standards.
- <u>Front Bus Shelter</u> we are currently working with the Assets Unit of the Department of Education to gain approval for the construction of a bus shelter to cover the student waiting bays at the front of the school. This project has been in the pipeline for some time so we are encouraged to see progress being made.
- <u>School Bus Shelter</u> we are in the early stages of the planning to construct a cover over the school mini-buses. This cover will expand out from the existing shelter on the school hall at the end of the carpark. As these buses are relatively new, protecting them from the weather elements will extend the their service life which results in longer use for students and staff.

External Validation (EV)

Throughout this year the school has been preparing a submission package of information which provides a 'report card' of how the school is progressing. On Thursday 27th July, members of the school leadership team will meet with the EV panel (DoE staff) to review our submission. The team has been working tirelessly to put together the final submission by the end of the term. The focus of the EV is to gather, annotate and analyse evidence across five themes linked to our School Improvement Plan (SIP- which was communicated in newsletter issue 1 this year). The analysis allowed us to make an on balanced judgement (Self-Assessment) against Learning, Teaching and Leading areas of the school. Collaborative discussion will continue to determine recommendations for further directions and next steps for the school. The EV process occurs every four years and is part of The School Excellence Cycle. I would like to thank the operational leaders and teams for the leading the management of this submission.

Winter Uniform Expectations and Standards

As we head into the colder months, I remind our school community that students must wear full school and sport uniform correctly and follow procedures if not wearing a correct item. That is, a note is provided from home to give to the roll call teacher. Sport track suits are not to be worn with school uniform and we are a no hoodie school. Deputy Principals will communicate with families if there are ongoing uniform issues. I am please to report that our new jumpers have arrived (see flyer in newsletter) and are available for purchase.

Covid Update – a message from the Department of Education

At the commencement of the COVID-19 pandemic, the department scaled up our regular school cleaning program as part of a suite of temporary measures implemented to keep our schools clean and safe places for students and staff. The specialist and enhanced cleaning measures were guided by expert advice at the time from the Australian Health Protection Principal Committee, the National Health and Medical Research Council, and NSW Health. The department has been advised that there is no longer a benefit to undertaking the additional, enhanced cleaning of schools, employed to enable the safe return to school during the height of the pandemic. From Term 3 this year, the temporary enhanced cleaning measures will be discontinued. Schools will revert to receiving the regular, comprehensive day cleaning program, which also continued during the pandemic. The day cleaning program will see professional cleaners, under a whole-of-government cleaning contract, continue to maintain our schools as clean and safe spaces to learn and teach. While COVID-19 is no longer a global health emergency, it is important that collectively we work together to help prevent exposure to and the spread of germs and diseases by maintaining good hygiene practices at home and school. The willingness of our school communities to adapt and support the additional health, safety and wellbeing measures put in place over the last 3 years has been instrumental in ensuring continuity of quality education in safe learning and teaching environments. Student News On Monday the 29th of May, Ms Gardiner and Mrs Boulmetis took their respective Year 11 & 12 English Extension classes to the prestigious State Library of New South Wales, in Sydney. After some trouble navigating the trains during the morning rush in the city, and some coffees that were way too hot, our motley group of students and teachers approached the library. Grand doors loomed over us, with each step closer the presence grew more and more intense, and as our feet were about to grace the marble ground of a historic Australian monument, we were hastily instructed to go through the much less intimidating gift shop entrance. While waiting for our guide at the gift shop, everyone was distracted by the mesmerising sight that unfolded upstairs, in which several captivating art exhibits were on display. The allure of the exhibits was irresistible, and we couldn't resist the temptation to embark on a thrilling journey through a labyrinth of high culture that lay before us. Who would have thought that a library would also double as an art museum? Ranging from brilliantly detailed 18th century oil paintings to risqué photography, the exhibit was definitely a captivating experience. Especially when accompanied by some witty comments at the more "abstract" pieces on display. Before I knew it the museum had torn me away from the rest of the group, I searched for their location and next to "convention room A" they were found in what seemed to be a different place entirely. As my peer said in her article last year, "we were instantly transported back in time to Tudor England", which upon reading may seem like a common metaphor, however in this room's case it is an especially fitting description. Almost like it was made for inspiration, the room really was a whole new world. Stained glass shone a muted rainbow on what seemed like every book relating to Shakespeare, the ceiling beautifully inscribed in parallel patterns of Tudor roses, rosettes, mermaids, dolphins and lilies. The whole place seemed to be born from the imagination of a Shakespearean play, as if sketched from visualising Hamlet's study or Macbeth's library. Yet in the corner, away from all the Elizabethan distraction lay a book containing Shakespeare's original words, the pristine glass covering it alone gave it an air of prestige, a clear piece of history and upon reading the words, the unmatchable value of it was understood. However, as the awe wore off, and the confinement of a dozen students in a 4 by 4 room set in, we made our way to the more academically focused aspect of the trip. After learning how to utilise all of the library resources, we went to look at where they were stored. Stepping underground into a maze of shelves, the inner workings of the library were revealed. Fishing regulations from colonial times to published fanfiction, the collection of over six million books had literally anything imaginable, although after trying to find the most niche and interesting pieces we could, the time to leave the Kafkaesque labyrinth came. Alas, it was now time to embark on the purposeful pursuit that brought us to this esteemed establishment: our guest for intellectual nourishment. Immersed in the vast sea of information, we sought to guench our thirst for knowledge and found ourselves guided by the wisdom of authors and literary critics alike. Enlightened by the teachings nestled within the pages before us, we eagerly sought to expand our intellectual horizons. On the way out, we made sure to catch a glimpse of the famous Mitchell Library (which would need its own article to describe). It is as marvellous as the writings of the novels in its very shelves and considering the only audible sound is the chatter of keyboards, the visceral awe is like no other. The day was over and as the students went their separate ways, the Year 11 & 12's trip to the State Library came to a close.

It was a great afternoon and had everyone feeling good as they headed into their weekend!








Extra Curricular Events


