- **Staff Farewells**

Recently **Sue Moore** announced her retirement from full time duties in public education as a School Administration Officer. - **School Improvement and Project Update**

Front Bus Shelter – the administration tasks to gain approval for the construction of a bus shelter to cover the student waiting bays at the front of the school have been finalised with the Assets Unit of the Department of Education. Preliminary planning has now taken place to map out the timeline of completion for the project. We are looking forward to providing much needed shelter at the bus bay areas for students and staff.

School Bus shelter – approval has been granted for the construction of the shelter. Preliminary planning has also taken place to map out the timeline of completion for the project. This cover will expand from the existing shelter and extend from the school hall at the end of the carpark. As these buses are relatively new, protecting them from the weather elements will extend the life of the buses which will result in longer use for students and staff.

- **External Validation (EV) – panel meeting outcome**

Throughout this year the school has been preparing a submission package of information which provides a 'report card' of how the school is progressing. On Thursday 27th July, members of the school leadership team met with the EV panel (DoE staff) to review our submission. The focus of the EV is to gather, annotate and analyse evidence across five themes linked to our School Improvement Plan (SIP- which was communicated in newsletter issue one this year). The analysis allowed us to make an on-balanced judgement (Self-Assessment) against Learning, Teaching and Leading areas of the school. We are very pleased to report that the panel supported all our quality judgements. This all means that the school has been reviewed and validated as performing and functioning at an above average level across fourteen elements in the areas of:

Learning (culture, wellbeing, curriculum, assessment, reporting, student performance measures).

Teaching (effective classroom practice, data use and skills, professional standards, learning and development).

Leading (educational leaderships, school planning implementation and reporting, school resources, management practices and processes).

The panel also worked through and agreed with our further directions and next steps for the school. The EV process occurs every four years and is part of the School Excellence Cycle. I would like to thank the panel team for their participation and positive contributions at the meeting.

- **Subject selections update**

We had a fantastic turn out to our Year 8 and 10 subject selection night for 2024 earlier in the term. We are now in the planning stage of working out which courses will run based on student selections, staffing and timetabling. Mr Meagher (year 10) and Ms Sayed-Rich (year 8) will follow up with any student who missed the deadline. The timetabling process is designed to match the selections of the vast majority of students. The DPs will speak with any student who may need to select another course(s) if needed. We expect the planning and decision stage of the timetabling process to be finalised by the back end of term 3.

- **Winter Uniform Expectations and Standards**

The new school jumper has been a wonderful success. In the first two weeks of sales, we had 320 jumpers sold and this number continues to rise. With student uptake of the jumper, hoodies are now a very minor issue. However, we are still experiencing challenges from a small number of students (especially girls) with regards to wearing the school tracksuit pant or other not approved black pants, and white shoes as part of the school uniform attire. The school will continue to monitor and enforce the uniform requirements. Thank you to the full school community for supporting uniform compliance. If any families have a uniform issue, please communicate with your child's Deputy Principal.

- **New School Canteen Transition**

Over the holiday break 'Made Fresh' replaced 'Total Canteen Solutions'. Early feedback from the students has been positive with regards to food quality, choice, prices and service. We also welcome parent feedback as we continue to work on providing a canteen service that meets the needs of our school community. Subject Selections Year 8

Thank you to our school community—we had many parents who attended the Subject Selection Night on Wednesday 19th July. It was a highly informative night with lots of questions and discussions with parents and students. Thank you also to our Head Teachers, teachers, and Year Advisers for supporting our students at this event. Subject selections needed to have been submitted by Friday 29th July. The signed printed selection form should also be returned now. If any students have not returned the form, it needs to be returned to Ms Sayed-Rich. Year 8 will be informed about their selections towards Week 7 or 8 in Term 3. Students will be given the opportunity to apply to change selections late in Term 3. Please be aware that a change can only occur if a vacancy exists.

I would also like to congratulate Year 8 on the number of students who have gained academic, sporting, CAPA performance, or community participation awards. The number has been outstanding. This is a great start to their high school years and is laying down the good solid habits needed to achieve the students best at becoming skilled learners, skilled citizens, and skilled for life.

High Expectations

The school has this term revisited and revised our core rules concerning behaviour. Each year group had a year assembly where the rules were revised. These rules are: first time every time, on time and line up, right place – right time, phone away and on silent, hands up and wait for the teacher. Please take time to talk to your child/ren about these rules. We are pleased in the way students are showing respect and commitment towards these rules.

Student Attendance – Everyday Counts. Students with below 90% attendance are educationally at risk. It has long been accepted that there is a direct correlation between good school attendance rates and successful educational outcomes and life opportunities. The better the attendance, the better the outlook for student learning and opportunities after school. When attendance is bad, the outlook is not so good. More recent research paints an even clearer picture and reinforces beliefs about the correlation between student attendance and the achievement of quality academic, socio-economic, and health outcomes. The latest research goes even further and tells us that students with an attendance rate below 90% are educationally at risk. This comes as a surprise to most people. We think of 90% as being a good thing. Ninety percent in an exam or a 90% success rate is perceived as a positive thing. We have learned that 90% attendance is the bare minimum a child needs to truly be successful in their education. When you work out the maths, the child with 90% attendance does NOT come to school for one day in every fortnight.

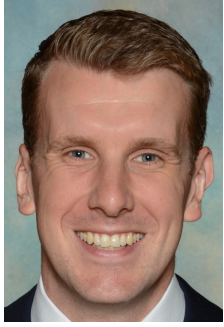

Year 11

Term three is the final term and the final assessments for the Preliminary HSC ROSA. Skills of time management and organisation are especially important at this stage. Habits of regular study and homework should have been developed by now ready to take on the challenge of the HSC in Term 4. This term may be a particularly suitable time to sit and talk with your child/ren about this topic. You may have heard your child indicate “they don’t need to do the work as I am dropping this subject.” All Year 11 students must complete all the work for the twelve units of the Preliminary HSC course to be eligible for the Preliminary HSC ROSA. It is still particularly important that parents encourage and support a balanced approach between study, social life, sport, part time work and sleep. Good nutrition is also essential.

Year 7

Year 7 have continued to grow into their place here at Menai High and it is great to see them figure out their corners of the school and forge ahead with their passions. Whether I am visiting the farm at lunchtime, or the oval during break times, or dropping in on Food Tech classes (to sample some of the food, of course) I'm genuinely so impressed with how well these students are taking to high school life. One highlight was watching 42 Year 7 boys playing a game of basketball before school last week; there were students from 11 different primary schools, all with different ability levels and friendship groups getting along incredibly well, supporting each other and making a point to include any student who walked by. There will continue to be teething issues and bumps along the road*, but the potential this grade has over the next few years is enormous (not even to mention their impressive NAPLAN results which I'll distribute a full analysis of later in the year).

I am becoming more aware of incidents throughout Year 7 of friendship issues, bullying and conflict. As much as we promote resilience and problem solving, if your child is experiencing any issues with friends, bullies or anything in between, then please make contact with Ms Fenemore or Ms Perkins, the Year 7 Advisers. These issues often don't solve themselves, and we will always look to step in and assist when needed.

Year 10

Thanks to the families and parents re subject selections. It looks like all the Year 10 students who are returning next year have submitted their choices properly. The only real message I have for Year 10 at this point is to 'maintain the course'. The vast majority of students are engaged and learning and as they are moving toward assessment tasks they are appropriately ramping up their efforts and home study. If any students are unsure of the best way to revise or study, remember that the expert is standing in front of you in every class so just ask your teacher for their advice on how to study. A final reminder as we move towards the end of the year: work experience creeps up very quickly so make sure you are organised with this. The Year 10 Formal follows just afterwards so please make sure that all payments and permission notes are up to date.

Uniform

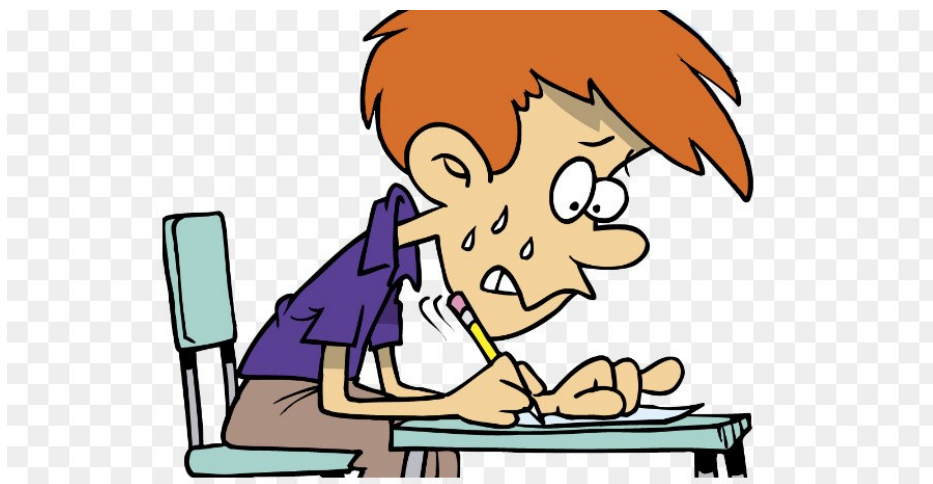

There were also 400 primary school students who were lucky enough to attend. The production will take place every two years so we look forward to seeing what 2025 will bring.
